From the Pastor...

"On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well aged wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well aged wines strained clear. And he will destroy on this mountain the shroud that is cast over all peoples, the sheet that is spread over all nations; he will swallow up death forever."

This passage from Isaiah is one of many references in scripture to a feast or banquet. Food is very important in the scriptures. "THEN AND NOW"

Trinity's Ongoing Adult Bible Study From The Church Health Team

For the past seven years, Trinity has had an Ongoing Adult Weekly Bible Study. As the Natural Church Development (NCD) process revealed a weakness in our passionate spirituality, the Church Health Team organized these studies. An initial Bible study survey indicated that 20 people were interested in mostly mixed (men and women) groups. With preferred times listed via the survey,

4 weekly sessions facilitated by volunteers have endured with an average of 34 participants per week. This is a 59% increase from 2010-2017.

Over the course of time, reviewing participants' names, there have been a minimum of 50 different individuals who have engaged in the weekly conversations! This translates to a significant number of weekly worshippers.

At Pastor Eli's direction, the studies have covered the BOOKS OF JAMES, HEBREWS, JONAH, RUTH, ESTHER, GALATIANS, 1 JOHN, 2 JOHN, 3 JOHN, OBADIAH, 1 CORINTHIANS, 2 CORINTHIANS,

The 46 PARABLES OF JESUS, The 34 MIRACLES OF JESUS, and selected chapters and themes from THE BOOK OF PROVERBS.

In addition to these weekly gatherings, the Church Health Team launched the 21 day "Gospel of John Challenge" and the Gospel of Matthew "Pair-Share-Bible Dare." Both of these partnered activities provided varied opportunities for Bible study. There were 51 folks in the "Gospel of John Challenge" and 18 people who signed up for "Pair-Share-Bible Dare."

As St. Paul states in 2 Tim.3:16-17, "All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work." Embracing Bible study is one of the firm foundations for building our faith and deepening our relationship with God. This is where "Passionate Spirituality" is rooted. As we read and ponder God's living word, the Bible, the Holy Spirit reveals the path of righteousness that Jesus Christ desires us to walk!

There is NO PRIOR EXPERIENCE required for joining in on these Bible study sessions. Each year has seen new faces! The weekly worship bulletin and monthly Orbit calendar list the times. Announcements of topics and start-up times also are published and sent via broadcast emails. Fall and spring sessions have been the time frames with winter and summer breaks in between. For more information contact Lisa Bradley @ 943-7488 or just come on down! All groups meet at the church. Folks are encouraged to bring a family member, coworker, neighbor, or friend!

We need a lot of volunteers! Please use the sign-up sheet next to the sanctuary and fill in your name where you would like to volunteer. We could also use food and monetary donations to help offset the costs of items that may have been donated in the past, but that may not be donated this year.





CHAMBER MUSIC CONCERT

Trinity's next Sunderman Memorial Concert will be held on Sunday, April 30, at 3:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. The concert will feature the Allegheny String Quartet comprised of Genaro Medina, first violin; Dr. Jeremy Klapper, second violin; Lela Tsinadze, viola; and Kim Cook, cello.

Genaro Medina began studying music and the violin in his native country, Venezuela, under world-famous orchestral music program phenomenon "El Sistema." His orchestral career started at age 15, when he became a member of the first violin section of the Carabobo State Symphony Orchestra. Simultaneously, he became a member of The Ibero-American Orchestra and toured with it throughout the Americas. He gave solo recitals in different cities and performed as soloist with symphony orchestras including the Valencia Youth Orchestra, the Carabobo Symphony Orchestra, and the San Carlos Symphony. He has earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Duquesne University and has performed with the Pennsylvania Philharmonic Orchestra, the Lancaster Symphony Orchestra, the Duquesne University Symphony Orchestra, and Chamber orchestras in Europe and the United States.

A native of Ohio, Dr. Jeremy Klapper is a current member of the Altoona Symphony and a practicing pathologist at UPMC Altoona. He has studied violin since the age of 9 and has played with a symphony in Orlando, Florida, and the Houston Symphony.

Lela Tsinadze studied violin and viola both in her native Republic of Georgia and at the University of Louisiana, Lafayette, LA. She has won concerto competitions in the Republic of Georgia and in the US and has played with the Pennsylvania Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Pops Orchestra, the Philadelphia Virtuosi Chamber Orchestra, the Princeton University Symphony Orchestra and Jazz Ensemble, and orchestras in Illinois, Louisiana, Alabama, and the Republic of Georgia. She currently teaches strings at a studio she maintains with her husband, Genaro Medina.

Kim Cook holds the rank of Distinguished Professor of Music at Penn State University, University Park, where she teaches cello. She has performed as a soloist in the United Kingdom, France, Italy, Germany, Austria, the Czech Republic, Finland, Russia, China, Israel, Jordan, Latin America, and throughout the United States. She has recorded concertos by Shostakovich, Tchaikovsky, Dvorak, and Haydn as well as the solo sonatas of Kodaly, Crumb, and Hindemith. She earned Penn State's 2016 Faculty Scholar Medal for Outstanding Achievement, and she served as the inaugural Penn State Laureate.

A highlight of the program will be the "American" quartet by Dvorak (quartet in F major, op. 96).

"Lift High the Cross" -is a 19th century Christian hymn. It was written in 1887 by George Kitchin while he was the church of England Dean of Winchester, for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. It has been suggested that the hymn was inspired by the story of Constantine the Great's conversion to Christianity. The hymn was revised in 1916 by Michael R. Newbolt. It was first published in the United States in 1974 and first appeared in the Lutheran Book of Worship in 1978.

"I Know that My Redeemer Lives" (lyrics)- was written by Samuel Medley. He was born in 1738 near London, England. Although he was raised by a family of faithful Christians, he did not practice religion during most of his youth. However, in 1759, he witnessed a miracle which changed the course of his life. Medley was a member of the British Navy and was in a battle that left one of his legs severely wounded. The ships doctor told him that if the leg did not improve by the next day, he would be forced to amputate. Medley spent the night pondering his family's Christian teachings and praying that his life and leg would be spared. The next morning, the doctor found that the leg had miraculously improved and amputation was unnecessary. The miraculous healing was the catalyst for Medley's decision to live a Christ centered life.

Have you heard the Trinity Youth Choir lately? They meet each Sunday at 10:20am for practice. These dedicated children provide special music/anthems at 10:45 am services at various times throughout the year. I have provided information about adult choir in many of my articles, so this month, I will focus on the youth.
